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LETTER TO ALL PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center and its faculty welcome your interest in expanding your knowledge of integrative therapies for animals. The goal of attending and successfully completing this Postgraduate Education in Veterinary Spinal Manipulative Therapy (VSMT) or Veterinary Massage and Rehabilitation Therapy (VMRT) is to gain a basic understanding of what, how, when, and where of these medical therapeutic modalities and how they could be provided competently and safely to improve patient outcomes. By completing the program, licensed professionals can expand their curriculum vitae and credentials. It is well accepted that the public's demand for competent practitioners of integrative veterinary medicine and therapies has increased in recent years. The Healing Oasis Wellness Center is unique in providing such health care modalities by drawing from both Western and Eastern philosophies. Our co-founders (Dr. Pedro Luis Rivera and Michelle J. ABOUT THE HEALING OASIS WELLNESS CENTER

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center in Sturtevant, Wisconsin, is an Educational Institution offering Postgraduate Professional Certification Programs in veterinary integrative therapy modalities. To the best of our knowledge, it is the first of its kind, providing such an in-depth education worldwide since 1998.

The institution, with its campus, is located in a small town in southeastern Wisconsin. There is easy access to the interstate system and plenty of hotels, stores, and restaurants within a 3-mile radius. The center's physical location is **2555 Wisconsin St., Sturtevant, WI 53177**; phone: 262-898-1680; fax: 262-886-6460; email: info@healingoasis.edu. It consists of a 7,000 sq ft building with 3,500 sq. Ft. of clinic space, 2000 sq. Ft. of the lecture facility, and the rest is divided between the snack room, kitchen, classrooms, main office with library, and restroom services. Each lecture room has its own projector, osseous anatomical specimens, and the equipment necessary to teach each postgraduate program.

Class sizes are kept to a maximum of participants, allowing for small classes and a more personal, relaxed learning environment. Applicants must have a degree and a current, valid license in good standing (see the application form and the section discussing specific requirements). Rescue facilities or private owners provide all patients evaluated and treated during hands-on practicums.

The institution does not seek or recruit attendees, either directly or through third-party companies. The institution relies primarily on word-of-mouth referrals and on factual, ethical, and accurate advertisements that comply with the accrediting institution's rules and regulations.

All postgraduate programs presented at the school have been approved by the Wisconsin Dept of Safety & Professional Services-Educational Approval Program (www.dsp.wi.gov; dspseap@wisconsin.gov). Both postgraduate state-approved certification programs (VMRT and VSMT) are approved for the **GI Bill**® by the WI State Approving Agency [SAA] for Veterans' Education Benefits, Dept. of Veterans Affairs [DVA]. To our knowledge, we are the only program with such approval. The "GI Bill®" is the US Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) 's registered trademark. The VMRT certification program is also listed as a resource by the American Association of Rehabilitation Veterinarians (AARV, www.rehabvets.com) and the Academy of Physical Rehabilitation – Veterinary Technicians (APRVT, www.aprvt.com). The **VSMT** program is also approved by the College of Animal Chiropractors (CoAC, www.collegeofanimalchiropractors.org) and the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association (www.animalchiropractic.org). The school is a recognized, accredited educational institution under the Accrediting Council for Continuing Education & Training, American Association of Veterinary State Boards – RACE program (for continuing education), American Holistic Veterinary Medical Association (AHVMA), and the Minnesota Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE VETERINARY MASSAGE AND REHABILITATION THERAPY (VMRT) POSTGRADUATE CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

The curriculum consists of a minimum of **142 hours** of supervised instruction. A maximum of 12 students per class allows us to maintain a 2-3-to-1 ratio of students to faculty during hands-on clinical practicums. Once the course has started, no other student will be allowed to join, even if there have been dropouts or dismissals. Students will have a reading assignment in each Module, which may take 4-5 hours to complete outside class hours. Each student must present a total of two (2) cases. A "case" constitutes either a patient examined by you or sent to you for evaluation. Proper

SOAP record protocol must be followed, documenting the patient's primary complaint, objective findings, physical findings, and treatment/progress plan.

A total of **4 (four)** Modules will encompass an entire "class" or "complete curriculum." Each Module consists of 4 (four) days, beginning on Thursdays / Fridays and Saturdays (8:00am - 12pm, 1pm – 6/7pm), and Sunday (8:00am-1:30pm). Depending on the Module, longer hours may be required.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE VMRT POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM

The following requirements are the minimum necessary that the staff feels would allow students to pursue a successful path in this field.

- Must be a licensed/registered or certified (as it applies to their listed profession) healthcare provider. (i.e., Veterinarian, Chiropractor, Veterinary Technician, Massage Therapist, Nurse or Physical Therapist, others. If in doubt, don't hesitate to contact the office.) in good standing with their respective state/provincial/governmental licensing board (**must sign application form attesting to said good standing).
- For professionals registering from outside the North American continent, please provide a copy of the country's pertinent Visa, Diploma, and proper governmental licensure in that you are licensed and currently practicing. **All applicants must**

include a copy of their diploma and current (not expired) state or provincial/governmental license or certification.

- Two-character reference letters. Both references should be from a non-family member. If self-employed, please include a note briefly describing your practice.
- Licensed non-veterinary professionals must also include the signed, initialed, and filled waiver titled "Waiver/Disclaimer for Non-Veterinary Licensed Professionals."
- Two passport photos.
- **All licensed professionals** must include a letter stating that they understand your state's rules and regulations as they apply to integrative/complementary veterinary modalities.
- **For the current programs**, include a \$200.00 deposit, with the application form. The remaining tuition of \$5,989.00 is to be paid on the first day of class, for a total of \$6,189.00, or earlier if preferred. All currencies are in US dollars. Please, no foreign checks.

A deposit of \$200.00 (which includes a \$100.00 non-refundable administrative fee) must be included with the application form, with the remaining tuition (\$5,989.00) due on the first day of class (for a total tuition cost of \$6,189.00). The school is **not approved** to provide financial aid (Federal Title IV). The application deadline is two (2) weeks before the scheduled classes begin. However, registration may close earlier if the maximum number of registrants is reached.

The student will receive a letter (via USPS or email) confirming their reservation for the specific postgraduate training dates. Please remember that all students must provide all applicable admissions requirements to be considered for the program. A brief interview is required for all participants before the program begins. The informal interview will be held on the first day of class, 1- 1 1/2 hours before classes are scheduled to start. All interviews will be held on a "first-come, first-serve basis."

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center will offer no advanced standing for participants who have attended weekend seminars, videotaped seminars, correspondence seminars, "gained" experience, or any type of seminars. Suppose the applicant has successfully completed (providing documentation) a basic program that the American Association of Rehabilitation Veterinarians recognizes. In that case, the applicant can attend an audit of any of the first three (3) modules offered at the Healing Oasis School. As an auditor, you will only receive a certificate of attendance validating the continuing education that you have attended. Please contact the school directly for auditing information and pricing details.

ACADEMIC CORE CURRICULUM FOR THE VMRT POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM

Anatomy: Review the names, locations, and functions of each bone and muscle in the non-human animal body TOTAL: 31HRS

Neurology: An essential part of massage is understanding and maintaining a functional nervous system. This class will emphasize FUNCTIONAL NEUROLOGY as it applies to VMRT (including the central and peripheral nervous system). TOTAL: 12HRS

Physiology of Inflammation: This class will help students understand the importance of the inflammatory process and how, although it is a natural response of the body, it can cause damage to affected areas. TOTAL: 5 HRS

Rehabilitation Therapy and Massage Hands-On: This class will be the core of the massage and rehabilitation training program. Students will learn the movements, techniques, and treatment protocols for relaxation, therapeutic massage, and therapeutic rehabilitation (including exercise, electrical stimulation, and ultrasound, among others), depending on the class preference for small or equine species. TOTAL: 60 HRS

TCM basics: The basis of traditional Chinese medicine, Tao, Taoism, Yin and Yang, triple warmer, and some herbs will be discussed. TOTAL: 2HRS

Nutrition: Essential to the body's healing and functional mechanisms. Various nutritional supplements and diets, their pros, and cons and how they work will be addressed throughout the program. TOTAL: 2HRS

Myology: This class will address all changes that occur not only at the cellular level during normal function, but also the pathological changes that the practitioner must always keep in mind. TOTAL: 3HRS

Biomechanics: This class will explain all the biomechanical changes that occur when the body performs normal functions under stress or as compensatory changes after a massage. TOTAL: 5HRS

Ethics and Legalities: This class will prepare students to address everyday legal issues in conventional or integrative/complementary practice and record maintenance. TOTAL: 3HRS

Tui Na: This ancient Chinese form of massage, which uses hands-on and energy work, will be studied as it applies to animals. TOTAL: 2HRS

Integrative Veterinary Therapy Modalities: Basic introductory lectures will be provided so that practitioners have a basic understanding of the what, when, where, and how of these health care modalities. Some of the modalities to be discussed include (but not limited to) Reiki, Shiatsu, Acupuncture, and Spinal Manipulation. TOTAL: 4HRS

Animal Handling: Basic husbandry knowledge is required. However, basic animal restraint techniques will be reviewed to ensure the safety of both the patient and the practitioner, enabling effective massage techniques to be performed. TOTAL: 3HRS

Case Presentation & Management: Students will present four (4) cases they have examined and treated. Ideas and standard operating procedures (through case presentations) will be given so that case intake will become second nature and proper therapeutic protocols and a realistic prognosis can be achieved and communicated to our patients' owners. TOTAL: 10HRS

BENEFITS AND OBJECTIVES OF ATTENDING, AND SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THE VMRT PROGRAM

Some of the benefits that students will gain include (but are not limited to):

- Attaining a certification in veterinary massage and rehabilitation therapy.
- Ability to define and describe what rehabilitation is, the main components, and how to apply these components in a knowledgeable, competent, and safe way to provide the therapies.
- As it applies to functional rehabilitation, the ability to locate and describe pertinent and clinically relevant muscular and osseous anatomy.
- Ability to evaluate (under direct supervision by the faculty) and assess patients' progress.
- Ability to design and plan treatment protocol(s) that are tailored to the individual patient. Protocols may address soft-tissue injury, orthopedic conditions, or maintenance of athletic conditioning. The ultimate goal of the treatment is to improve the quality of life and return to normal function and performance as safely as possible.
- Ability to list and describe the local, spinal segmental influence, suprasegmental stimulation, influences, and modulation of rehabilitation (massage therapy included). This localization of the level of origin allows the graduate to treat the resulting clinical condition more accurately.
- Ability to provide sound recommendations for therapeutic modalities that might benefit the patient.

- Ability to describe the biomechanical changes observed, find etiologies for those changes, and how they could be addressed to improve patient outcomes.
- Ability to determine the longitudinal level of the lesion, which allows the graduate to address the clinical condition more accurately.
- To integrate the presented information for veterinary technicians who choose to apply for the optional specialty offered by the Academy of Physical Rehabilitation Veterinary Technician.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION FOR **THE VMRT POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM**

THE TOTAL COST FOR THE ENTIRE VMRT POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM is \$6,189.00 (six thousand, one hundred eighty-nine dollars), which includes a \$200 deposit, of which \$100.00 is a non-refundable administrative fee. Payment is expected in full during the first day of the first Module, after the interview. Students will have a list of suggested textbooks (from which reading material will be used throughout the program) and two required textbooks (with an approximate cost of about \$ 110.00 USD) that can be purchased through several online bookstores. The prices of the other books will vary depending on where and how they are purchased.

For other expenses, please see the section under "Performance Evaluation." The Healing Oasis Wellness Center is not approved for federal financial aid or Title IV assistance.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE IDL-Hybrid VETERINARY SPINAL MANIPULATIVE THERAPY (VSMT) POSTGRADUATE STATE-APPROVED CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

The entire VSMT curriculum is a blended (hybrid) program that utilizes Interactive Distance Learning (IDL), face-to-face didactic lectures, and extensive supervised, hands-on clinical practicum training. This IDL-Hybrid program is divided into three required sections.

- Approximately 37 hours of asynchronous educational videos (AEVs) must be viewed in a specific sequence. These AEVs are comparable in replacing 57 hours of face-to-face onsite with student-to-student and student-to-faculty interaction. See the program curriculum and the provided syllabus for specifics.
- Approximately 35 hours of scheduled synchronous educational Webinars (SSEWs) to present new material, help with student and faculty interaction, and integrate the AEVs and previously attended face-to-face interaction.

- As an IDL-Hybrid, all AEVs are components of the program.
- Face-to-face supervised education (approximately 182hrs).

The first Module for the IDL-Hybrid program **begins** once the student, with the provided username and password, enters and opens the Moodle section. The SSEWs will be listed as the OFF-Campus dates. Remember that before you attend the SSEWs, you will need to view several pre-recorded asynchronous educational videos that make up a crucial part of the program. For specifics, please REFER TO THE PROGRAM SYLLABUS provided to you.

There is a maximum of twenty (20) students per class, allowing us to keep a maximum ratio of three or 2 – 3 students to one faculty member for practical hands-on practicum clinical labs. Once the class has started, no other student will be allowed to join, even if there have been dropouts or dismissals.

Each student must present a total of two (2) cases. A "case" constitutes either a patient examined by you or sent to you for evaluation. Proper SOAP records must be maintained, including the primary complaint, objective findings, physical findings, and treatment/progress plan.

A total of **five (5) Modules** (one Module will be off-campus, and four (4) Modules will be face-to-face) will encompass an entire class or complete the curriculum. Each face-to-face Module consists of 5 days: Wednesday (1:00 pm – 8:00 pm), Thursday/Friday, and Saturday (8:00 am – 12 pm, 1 pm – 8 pm), and Sunday (8:00 am- 1:30 pm). Depending on the Module, longer hours might be required.

INFORMATION ABOUT INTERACTIVE DISTANCE LEARNING EDUCATIONAL METHODOLOGY

Interactive Distance Learning (IDL) is a means of delivering education through an electronically facilitated environment. IDL supports and encourages substantial interactions among students and between students and faculty. Interactions can be delivered synchronously or asynchronously through the internet, Webinars, audio conferencing, or any other wireless method.

IDL-Hybrid programs help registered attendees in many ways:

- Minimizes traveling with secondary expenses.
- Minimizes time away from family, and of course, business.
- Allow the registered attendees to view the pre-recorded lectures at their own time.
- All AEVs and SSEWs are components of the postgraduate program

****However, you must set aside time to view the required asynchronous educational recordings that are part of the program, practice the techniques presented, and attend scheduled synchronous educational Webinars—waiting until the last minute is discouraged.**

There will be pre-scheduled synchronous educational Webinars presenting specific lectures. The registered attendees will sometimes be divided into breakout rooms to discuss homework and clinical cases and provide time for questions and answers. Interactions can also provide student-to-student and student-to-faculty interactions. The program director (Dr. Pedro Luis Rivera) is the principal faculty in charge of all Webinars and individual communication with students. For specifics about scheduled SSEWs, please refer to the program syllabus.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE VSMT IDL-Hybrid PROGRAM

The following requirements are the minimum that the faculty feels would allow a student to succeed in this program.

- Licensed chiropractor (DC) or veterinarian (DVM, VMD) in good standing with their particular state/provincial/governmental licensing board (**must sign application form attesting to said good standing).
- Professionals registering from outside the North American Continent: Completed and graduated from a Veterinary Medical Program or Chiropractic Medical School (as viewed by the AVMA / ACA respective council on education). Must have a pertinent Visa, diploma, and proper governmental licensure from the country they are currently practicing.
- Two-character reference letters. Both references should be from a non-family member. If self-employed, please include a note with a brief description of your practice, and the second letter from a veterinarian.
- Licensed non-veterinary professionals must also include the signed, initialed, and filled waiver titled "Waiver/Disclaimer for Non-Veterinary Licensed Professionals."
- Include a copy of your current and valid state license (current residence).
- Include a copy of your chiropractic or veterinary diploma.
- Two passport-size photos.
- **All licensed professionals** must include a signed letter stating that they understand your state/provincial rules and regulations as they apply to "animal chiropractic" or veterinary spinal manipulative therapy, as set forth by their respective licensing boards.
- For the current programs, please include a \$200.00 deposit, of which \$100 are non-refundable, with the application form. The remaining tuition of \$8,189.00 must be paid before Module I starts, for a total cost of \$8,389.00. Please refer to your syllabus for specific due dates. All currencies are in US dollars. Please, no foreign checks.
- As an IDL-Hybrid program, you will also need access to high-speed internet, a computer, a camera, a microphone, and a speaker.

Applicants will continue to be accepted until the maximum of twenty (20) students is reached. The application deadline is 2 (two) weeks before the scheduled classes begin. Registration may be closed early if the maximum number of attendees is reached.

The application form must include a deposit of \$200.00 (which includes a \$100.00 non-refundable administrative fee). The remaining tuition of \$8,189.00 (for a

total cost of **\$8,389.00**) is due two weeks before the first day of school. The school is not approved to provide financial aid as it is not a Federal Title IV institution.

The student will receive a letter (via USPS) or an email confirming their reservation for this postgraduate training. All students must complete all applicable admissions requirements. Before the program begins, all participants must complete a brief interview. The interviews will be conducted via Webinar about two to three weeks before the scheduled starting date. Check the program syllabus for more specific information on scheduled webinar-based interviews.

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center will offer no advanced standing for participants who have attended weekend seminars, videotaped seminars, correspondence seminars, "gained" experience, or workshops. If the applicant has successfully completed (must include documentation) a basic program approved by the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association (AVCA), College of Animal Chiropractors (CoAC), or the International Veterinary Chiropractic Association (IVCA), then they can attend and audit Modules II, III, or IV offered at the Healing Oasis Wellness Center. Please understand that the described auditors will **only** receive a certificate of attendance for continuing education. Don't hesitate to contact the school directly for auditing and price information.

ACADEMIC CORE CURRICULUM FOR THE VSMT IDL-Hybrid PROGRAM

Anatomy: Review the pertinent anatomy as it applies to veterinary spinal manipulative therapy. Students will also view dissection as part of the educational process.

TOTAL: 18HRS

Neurology (Basic & Advanced): An essential part of veterinary spinal manipulation is to understand and thus maintain a functional nervous system. This class will emphasize Functional Neurology as it applies to spinal manipulation. The neurologic mechanism by which VSMT causes changes will also be discussed at the local and supra-segmental levels.

TOTAL: 30HRS

VSC & Its Scientific Validity: This class will present up-to-date research validating the spinal manipulation healthcare modality and further expand knowledge of functional neurology & the vertebral hypomobility/subluxation complex.

TOTAL: 12HRS

Biomechanics: This class will explain the biomechanical changes that occur during normal body function and the pathophysiologic changes under stress. Saddle fitting is included under this section

TOTAL: 3HRS

Ethics and Legalities: This class will prepare students to address everyday legal issues in conventional and integrative practices. TOTAL: 4HRS

Rehabilitation Therapy: This class will give introductory information and techniques that can be used as adjunct modalities to speed up the healing process of the body TOTAL: 2HRS

Integrative Veterinary Therapy Modalities: Introductory lectures to provide practitioners with a basic understanding of some of the modalities (rehabilitation and laser therapies as examples) as they apply to VSMT. TOTAL: 3HRS

Veterinary Spinal Manipulation Techniques Lecture: This class will demonstrate basic techniques for adjusting specific segments of the spine at the cervical, thoracic, and lumbar levels; the extremities; the sacropelvic region; the sternum; Logan & cranial (sutures) techniques, among others. TOTAL: 19HRS

Veterinary Spinal Manipulative Techniques Laboratory (Hands-on): This lab will be utilized to practice and master the techniques taught in the introductory VSMT class. Both small and large animals will be available for application. In Module II, the students will also begin taking cases, adjusting them, reassessing, and developing protocols for caring for animals in a clinical setting. TOTAL: 107HRS

Case Presentations: Each student will present four (4) cases in which they utilize VSMT and explain the reasoning behind the diagnosis and treatment of each case. TOTAL: 5HRS

Philosophy: A synopsis of Spinal Manipulation philosophy will include the many differing views from the late 1800s to the 21st Century. TOTAL: 3HRS

Adjunct Veterinary Diagnosis: This class will emphasize the "diagnosis" aspect of case management, using a case-based approach. Ideas and standard operating procedures will be given, so that case intake and progress plan will become second nature and proper therapeutic protocols and a realistic prognosis can be achieved and communicated to the owners of our patients TOTAL: 8HRS

Pathology: This class will review common veterinary medical pathologies encountered on a day-to-day basis and that can benefit from VSMT. There will be an emphasis on when to adjust and when not to. TOTAL: 5HRS

Radiology: This class will review the normal vs. abnormal radiological findings at the cervical, thoracolumbar, Sacro-pelvic, & extremity regions. Emphasis will be placed on presenting clinical findings encountered in everyday practice/examination.

TOTAL: 5HRS

General & Infectious Diseases: This class will present general information to keep in mind when assessing a patient. Basic pharmacology, types of surgeries, diseases (infectious and zoonotic) & basic physiology will also be discussed.

TOTAL: 2HRS

BENEFITS & OBJECTIVES FOR ATTENDING, AND SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF THE VSMT IDL-HYBRID PROGRAM

Some of the benefits that students will gain include (but are not limited to):

- Attaining a certification in veterinary spinal manipulative therapy (CVSMT)
- Ability to define and describe what veterinary spinal manipulative therapy is, how it affects the body, the main components (vertebral subluxation complex), and how to apply this health care modality in a knowledgeable, competent, and safe way to the patients that are being treated.
- Ability to locate and describe pertinent and clinically relevant anatomy as it applies to VSMT and animal patients.
- Ability to locate, name, and describe the afferent influences that the adjustment provides to the patient, and how this divergent information helps improve cortical development through its segmental efferent modulation.
- Ability to evaluate (under direct supervision by the faculty) and assess the patient's progress.
- Ability to design and plan treatment protocols tailored to the individual patient, with the ultimate goal of improving their quality of life and returning to optimal normal function and performance.
- Ability to list and describe the local, spinal cord segmental level influence, suprasegmental stimulation, influences, and modulation of VSMT.
- Ability to provide sound recommendations for adjunct therapeutic modalities that might benefit the patient.
- Able to describe and explain the biomechanical changes (from a functional neuro-anatomical point of view) observed, find functional etiologies for those changes, and how VSMT could be used to treat and improve patient outcomes.
- Able to determine the longitudinal level of the lesion is critical for determining the effect clinically displayed by the patient and, therefore, correctly treating the cause of the symptom(s).
- Able to apply & sit for the optional certificate provided by the American Veterinary Chiropractic Association, or the College of Animal Chiropractors.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION FOR THE VSMT IDL-HYBRID PROGRAM

THE TOTAL COST for the entire IDL-Hybrid VSMT POSTGRADUATE PROGRAM is **\$8,389.00**, which includes a \$200 deposit, with a \$100.00 non-refundable administrative fee.

Payment is expected in full before the pre-scheduled informal interview. Please refer to the program syllabus provided to you. Students will have a list of suggested textbooks (including reading material throughout the program) and three required textbooks (total approximate cost of \$225.00 USD), which can be purchased through several online bookstores. The cost of the other books varies depending on where and in what form the books are acquired.

For other expenses, please see the section under "Performance Evaluation." The Healing Oasis Wellness Center is not approved for federal financial aid or assistance under Title IV.

SCHOOL SELF-EVALUATION PROCESS

The faculty will provide curriculum reviews to ensure current, accurate, relevant clinical information is presented. Lecture and PowerPoint reviews will be conducted on a module-to-module basis. Hands-on clinical practicum (technique) reviews will be conducted when new ideas are brought forth by faculty during staff meetings. Each program's curriculum will be reviewed by the faculty when scientific or clinical advancements or trends are recognized, or every four 4 years.

PERFORMANCE EVALUATION FOR ALL POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMS

Students are evaluated by various methods, including written, practical (small and large animals), anatomy, and oral integration evaluations. Each student's performance will be discussed & evaluated by the faculty (present on the given Module) and the individual student (one at a time) starting during Module II (two). Students will be given ideas to improve their performance during the personal review. In the unlikely event that students are falling below passing grades, a special assignment might be given to improve individual scores. If special homework is assigned to a student, a letter will describe the timetable, the subject(s) to be addressed, and the format in which it must be presented. Please see the section titled *"Improvement in Student Performance – Special Homework Protocol."* A faculty panel (minimum of two [2]) will provide ideas on how students can improve their performance.

To successfully complete the program, a minimum grade of 78.00% must be attained in **the following** sections: Written Evaluation, Canine Practical Evaluation, Equine Practical Evaluation, Oral Evaluation, and Anatomy Evaluation. All grades are calculated using up to 2 decimal points. No "rounding up" is performed. The grading scale is as follows:

A = 93 - 100%; B = 85 - 92%; C = 78 - 84%; Fail = less than 78%

Please be advised that a student **must** maintain a passing grade (78.00% or higher) when going into the third (3rd) Module of the VMRT program or the fourth (4th) Module of the VSMT program. If any of the sections fall below passing grade, the student will be given a choice of accepting **ONE (1)** special homework **per section** to help them improve their performance. The special homework grade will be AVERAGED with the lowest grade of the specific section. It is the student's responsibility to either accept or decline the said special homework. Faculty will emphasize the information presented to the student during student performance reviews and the approximate grade performance required to achieve the minimum passing grade of 78.00%. As described above, special homework assignments are provided to help students achieve a passing grade. NO special homework will be provided during the last Module of any program. If a passing grade is not achieved, the faculty present will list the Module that the student would be required to audit, among other requirements. The student must understand that all expenses are their responsibility (see below). The estimated cost to repeat any module would be \$1,250.00 plus their traveling expenses. Under no circumstances will a student who cannot achieve a passing grade receive a certification diploma, as attested by the school faculty.

If a student cannot achieve a passing grade to complete the program successfully, then a panel of faculty members will review each test (of the said student) for accuracy. The attending faculty will provide the student with a letter that will include their findings and suggestions to complete the program successfully. The student will have a maximum of 6 months to complete said task.

Improvement on Student Performance - Special Homework Protocol ALL Programs

The school's passing grade for any postgraduate state-approved certification program is 78.00% (carried to two decimal points) for each integration evaluation segment (section). Therefore, all numerical grades **within the same section** will be calculated (averaged) together.

The **Veterinary Massage and Rehabilitation Therapy (VMRT) program** has four (4) sections:

- Moodle (with multiple choice and short answers averaged together)
- Practical Integration Evaluation (Hands-on practicum & clinical integration averaged together)
- Anatomy Integration Evaluation
- Oral Integration Evaluation

The **IDL-Hybrid Veterinary Spinal Manipulative Therapy (VSMT) program** has five (5) sections:

- Moodle (with multiple choice and short answers averaged together)
- Canine Technique Practical Integration Evaluation
- Equine Technique Practical Integration Evaluation
- Anatomy Integration Evaluation

- Oral Integration Evaluation

All students will have **ONE** opportunity to improve their performance for each section. The grade to trigger said particular homework would be 70.00%. The student will have to decide whether to accept or decline said homework. A faculty panel (minimum of two [2]) will provide some ideas on the unique homework for students to improve their performance. The homework grade does not and will not replace a failing grade; instead, it will be averaged with the lowest grade across the sections. Said average is to improve the overall section.

Students must understand that no special homework is provided on or after Module IV of the VMRT or Module V of the IDL-Hybrid VSMT postgraduate programs. Suppose the student is deficient in any specific section or during the last Module of the attending program. In that case, they will be required to audit a specific Module as agreed by the attending faculty. The student may also be required to retake specific tests to show proficiency in the subject matter. Our goal is to help the student successfully complete the program.

PASSING / FAILING NOTIFICATIONS FOR ALL PROGRAMS

Students will be notified within a maximum of three (3) weeks whether they have completed the program. Certification in Veterinary Massage and Rehabilitation Therapy OR Certification in Veterinary Spinal Manipulative Therapy, as attested by the school faculty, will be awarded upon completion of the chosen program and its requirements.

If the student fails to meet all requirements, they will be provided with options recommended by the faculty that must be completed within a specific time frame. See the section titled "**Improvement on Student Performance - Special Homework Protocol.**" The goal is to help the student achieve successful completion.

CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS FOR ALL STUDENTS

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center is aware of the confidential nature of students' personal and academic records; therefore, the school exercises extreme care and concern in recording and maintaining said information. Such information will not be provided to an unauthorized person(s) or agencies without written consent from the student. Ultimately, the contract for program attendance is between the student and the institution or representative.

The school faculty recognizes the student's right to access their records. Students will be instructed during their first Module on the procedures to follow to review their testing (grade) records under the supervision of a designated faculty member. The school maintains signed application forms, application requirements, signed attendance sheets, grades, signed student progress reports/evaluations, official school communications with the student (including beginning and completion or termination date), copy of diploma, and certificate of attendance/continuing education, student grievances, and subsequent resolutions, and copies of special assignments (if needed), on all records of registered students. The information would be scanned and kept in

digital form after completing the record. Paper records are kept for **three years**, then digital records thereafter.

The school will facilitate requests to scan and send student records to other institutions after an official request has been received.

LICENSING OF VETERINARY INTEGRATIVE THERAPIES

To this day, no recognized governmental body (national, state, or provincial) oversees integrative/complementary therapies offered to non-human animals.

Pursuing the best postgraduate program is a matter of personal ethical values.

CLASSROOM CONDUCT FOR ALL PROGRAMS

As in any other professional school, professional standards are upheld:

1. No smoking on-premises
2. Respect each speaker; do not talk out of turn.
3. Keep personal communication devices silent or turned off during class
4. Respect each other's right to have an education
5. Respect each other's beliefs and knowledge
6. Under no circumstances will any abuse or rough handling of animals be tolerated; such conduct is grounds for immediate dismissal.
7. Dishonesty is not tolerated (includes vandalism of school property)
8. Possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs in any part of the classroom or premises will not be tolerated or allowed and would constitute grounds for immediate dismissal.
9. Disrespectful use of language will not be tolerated.
10. Inappropriate physical contact with individuals during school-related activities will not be tolerated and is grounds for dismissal.
11. If a student appears impaired or puts themselves or any classmate, staff, participant, or animal in jeopardy, they will be dismissed immediately.
12. Students must maintain an average of 78.00% or higher for EACH independent section to complete the program.
13. If the student engages in dishonest advertising or representation while attending the Modules or after dropping out of the program, this will constitute grounds for immediate dismissal and will not be allowed for readmission.
14. All students must comply with copyright and infringement laws.

Non-compliance with the above simple rules would constitute grounds for dismissal. If a dismissal is due to any of the above "rules of conduct," readmission will **not** be allowed, and reimbursement will be based on the established "pro-rata" refund (see the section under "Withdrawal from the Program")

COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

All complaints regarding conduct, grading, or any concerns shall be given in writing to either Dr. Pedro L. Rivera, Michelle J. Rivera, MT, VDT, any faculty member,

or the class president. The program director and faculty will be available to discuss any complaints and provide several options to remedy the situation. APPEAL PROCESS FOR ALL DISMISSALS

If a student is dismissed from the program, an appeal may be made in writing to the program directors (Dr. Pedro Rivera or Michelle J. Rivera). When reviewing the appeal, the program directors will consider all factors, including attendance, class participation, grades, and consultations with faculty who have had contact with said student. The student will be notified within 15 business days if the appeal is approved or denied. If approved, the student will be readmitted to the respective program.

ATTENDANCE FOR ALL PROGRAMS

100% attendance is required for the entire program (didactic & practicums). Attendance will be taken at the beginning and end of each day (signed attendance general spreadsheets) and will be kept in a binder in the program director's office. A student will be considered tardy for class if more than 20 minutes late or departing 20 minutes earlier. If a student is tardy or leaves early three times in a row, totaling 60 minutes within a Module or on a day of a Module, it will count as an absence. If students know they will be absent or tardy before class, they must call or inform the center of an excused absence. However, a student is considered to have provided constructive notice of withdrawal if they miss two (2) consecutive days of class.

In the unlikely event that the student receives an absence, then a faculty panel (minimum of two [2]) will provide a special homework (in an official communication) that the student must research and present to a faculty panel during the next scheduled Module.

Although leave of absence is not encouraged, certain extraordinary cases, such as activation to military duty (through the Department of Defense of the United States), death in the family, or severe illnesses that will cause the student to miss classes. If a leave of absence is for more than six months, then the student must reapply to enter (or continue) the program. If required, extra tutorial time is available at \$150.00 per hour; make-up reading assignments and quizzes will be assigned to complete the missing work.

There are NO probationary periods; students must complete all required work and maintain minimum grade standards (78.00% for EACH individual section) to successfully complete the chosen program for which the student is registered.

The last date of attendance (LDA) will be considered the scheduled face-to-face Module attended, the last IDL-Hybrid SSEW viewed or attended, or the

Moodle AEV logged participation, either in or out of sequence. For specific Module dates, please check the program you are interested in or review the program syllabus provided to you.

WITHDRAWAL FROM THE PROGRAM AND REFUND POLICY

If, for any reason, the student withdraws or is dismissed by the school before attending classes, there will be no charge to the student. All money except the non-refundable application fee of \$100.00 will be reimbursed to the student.

The student will receive a full refund (within ten business days) of all money paid if the student:

A student who withdraws or is dismissed after attending at least one unit (see below for definitions), but before attending 60% of the program in the current enrollment period, is entitled to a pro-rata refund as follows, based on the LDA:

- *Definition of 20%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module I student section, and opened/viewed/downloaded class note packets, and/or opened/viewed any available link(s) for the said Module.*
- *Definition of 25%: Once the student attends Module I (face-to-face or virtual attendance).*
- *Definition of 30%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module II, open/view/download any available links.*
- *Definition of 40%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module II, open/view/download the note packets and/or open any available links.*

- *Definition of 50%: Once the student attends the program's Module II (face-to-face or virtual attendance).*
- *Definition of 60%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module III, open/view/download the note packets and/or open any available links, or attend the Module (face-to-face or virtual).*

Definitions for the **IDL-Hybrid VSMT Program (divided into five Modules):**

- *Definition of One UNIT: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module I student section.*
- *Definition of 10%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module I student section, and opened/viewed/downloaded any available AEV link(s).*
- *Definition of 20%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module I student section, and opened/viewed/downloaded class note packets, opened/viewed any available link, or attended Module I (face-to-face or virtual attendance).*
- *Definition of 30%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module II, the student section, and opened/viewed/downloaded any link.*
- *Definition of 40%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module II, open/view/download any note packets and/or open/download any available file(s) or link(s), or attends Module II.*
- *Definition of 50%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module III student section, and opened/viewed/downloaded any available AEV link(s).*
- *Definition of 60%: Once the student has entered Moodle, Module III, open/view/download the note packets and/or open any available file or links, or have attended Module III.*

The school may retain a one-time application fee of no more than \$100.00 under this refund policy. The school will make every effort to refund prepaid amounts for books, supplies, and other charges sold by the school. If the institution cancels a program before the scheduled dates, students will receive a full refund. Refunds other than those under the "three-business-day" cancellation period will receive their pro-rata refund within 40 days of the termination date. If a student withdraws after attending 60% of the instruction and the withdrawal is due to mitigating circumstances beyond the student's control, the school may refund a pro-rata amount. If a student drops out of any program due to mitigating circumstances and has attended 60% of the program, they may transfer to the following scheduled Modules within the next six months. Readmission will not be allowed if the applicant has engaged in any deemed unethical practice/representation, has not followed the school rules of conduct, or is under any licensing board's investigation. A written notice of withdrawal is not required. All attendees who drop out must reapply to attend the following scheduled program.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES:

Upon completion and graduation from any of the postgraduate school programs, students will be exceptionally qualified to offer various professional services that can be used to enhance conventional veterinary medicine. All graduates are encouraged to comply with the AVMA bylaws and regulations, as well as the individual state practice

acts, relating to Alternative/Integrative/Complementary Therapy Modalities. The school will offer ethical and business lectures on using and marketing the newly acquired knowledge.

The Healing Oasis Wellness Center **does not offer employment/placement services or guarantee employment to participants during or after the program.** However, any job opening provided or sent to the school office will be displayed on the bulletin board for all students to see and read. Student referrals to prospective employers are not based on direct contact with employers regarding current job openings. It would be up to the student to contact the prospective employer for job particulars.

LIBRARY

The school will have a separate office serving as a library. All required books and suggested reading materials will be available to the students while the faculty are on-premises. Library textbooks may not be taken off-premises.

DIRECTIONS TO THE CENTER FROM INTERSTATE 94

From Interstate 94 going south: Go east on Highway 20 / Exit #333 (Washington Avenue) for about 2.5 miles. You will cross under a railroad bridge and turn on Wisconsin Street at the lights. You will head south for about 0.8 miles, passing the Army Reserve facility and the Correctional Center. You will see the Healing Oasis Main Campus on your left. The town of Sturtevant is just another block south of there. Note that the speed limit drops to 30 mph before reaching the school building.

From Interstate 94 going north: Go east on Hwy 11 / Exit #335 (Durand Ave.) for about 2.5 miles. Once you pass the first traffic light (Will's RV Center), take the left lane as you will be making a left turn (going north) right after the railroad tracks (US Bank on the corner) on Wisconsin St. Go about .8 miles. The Healing Oasis Main Campus is on your right (corner of Charles St. and Wisconsin).
